
Support from parishes and local groups

GREETINGS FROM THE CHAIR

Join the children of our diocese as they celebrate the tradition of the crib

The glorious season of Advent is now upon us; a time to reflect in the joyous birth of Jesus. For too many though, it becomes a financial burden as we get caught up in the commercial aspects of Christmas. So what better than to join our children in their quest to explore the traditional meaning of the crib?

During Advent the Catholic Children's Society is launching 'Cribs for Kids' and inviting school children to make their own nativity scenes and consider the needy families across the Diocese. Just as children re-enact the stories or their superheroes and favourite characters through role play or models such as Lego or Play Mobil, St. Francis created the first nativity scene in the village Greccio in 1223. His aim was to make the Christmas story come alive for the shepherds and farmers of the locality in an effort to share his happiness and devotion to the infant Jesus and promote the true meaning of Christmas. His idea caught on, and now nativity scenes can be seen all over the world in homes, churches and public places.

'Cribs for Kids' hopes that by making their own cribs, students will:

- be put in touch with the simplicity of God's love and the magnitude of his caring for the poor, needy and suffering
- consider those who are less fortunate and understand that Christmas can be a difficult time for families living in poverty
- realise that helping and caring for others is the greatest gift that they can give.



So wherever we encounter a nativity scene this Christmas - in the shops, in the streets, at home or in church - let's take a moment to think about how we can make the Christmas story come alive for those around us and for the poor of our diocese. Please pray for the families who can barely afford heating and food let alone presents, toys and treats and please keep alive the tradition of making a donation to the Catholic Children's Society at the crib in your parish church.



ANNUAL APPEAL

Thank you to everyone who contributed to the Annual Appeal in August. The total currently stands at just over £19K. Your generosity means that we can continue to help parents and carers as they struggle to provide a home and the basic needs for their children.



In 2015 the Society has made 89 grants including:

- school clothing for a number of refugee families
- beds and bedding for three children who were having to share a single bed or sleeping on the floor whilst waiting to be re-housed
- furniture for a mum and daughter seeking refuge from domestic violence; all their previous belongings had been destroyed in the struggle
- providing a hot meal a day to the children of a homeless family who were having to live in a different bed and breakfast each week

The Society strives to help these genuine cries for help as well as supporting parents and carers through our parenting programme, but despite everyone's generosity and efforts to fundraise it unfortunately continues to run at a deficit each year. Any further help you could give throughout the year would therefore be very much appreciated.

REFUGEE CRISIS


The Catholic Children's Society has been advised that it is one of the few agencies willing to consider grants for clothing for children in refugee families. These families find it difficult to gain financial support and aid from most agencies due to the immigration process and are therefore very grateful for any support they receive having fled from their hostile homelands with very few belongings.

PATCHWORK PARENTING



Schools and Children's Centres from across the three counties of Devon, Dorset and Cornwall were invited to a presentation on the work of the Children's Society with parents over the summer. As a result, our work is spreading more widely through

non-Catholic schools, although this term, we have continued working at Our Lady's Barnstaple, St Paul's, Plymouth, and St Mary's Bodmin. Our parenting programmes are suitable for all parents regardless of their faith commitment, and this new approach means we can give support to as many parents as possible. Our 'Pushchair and Primary' and 'Time for Parents' courses are offered on a self-referral basis, meaning that any parent who wishes to take part can sign up; please contact the host school or the Patchwork office on 01364 645421.
