Your continued support is always appreciated.

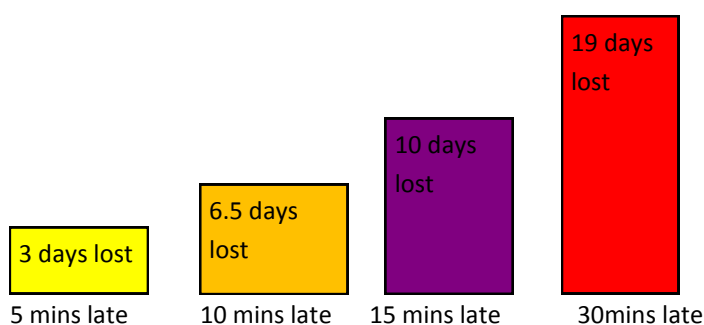

Governor News! Did You Come To The Science Fair?

I've always avoided learning more about basic scientific laws ever since failing my mock 'O' level chemistry back in the dark ages. However, as a governor, I couldn't duck out when invited to be one of the judges at St Mary's Science Fair after half-term. What a stimulating and informative morning it turned out to be. The children were all so enthusiastic in explaining and demonstrating their projects with even the youngest having a better grasp of scientific principles than myself. The variety and ingeniousness of their presentations was amazing. Clearly lots of time and effort during half-term went into achieving such a high standard and many children told us how much support parents/carers had given them, so I hope you also enjoyed researching & helping to test out their experiments.

Apart from cookery recipes, I don't remember knowing about the agent & reagent properties of bicarbonate of soda, food colouring and vinegar before, but I'm sure a good many of you have had to restock your food cupboards following your children's need for unlimited quantities to produce spectacular volcanic eruptions. There were some very detailed analysis of sugar content in soft drinks, germs on X Boxes, the varying air pressures that enable planes to stay airborne, making 'slime', and lots more. The more scientifically expert judges than myself were really impressed by the children's knowledge and understanding of scientific methods and I came away having learnt an amazing amount from them.

It is always exhilarating as a governor to visit classrooms at St. Mary's & observe your children enjoying lessons, so thank you for continuing to encourage and reinforce their learning at home.

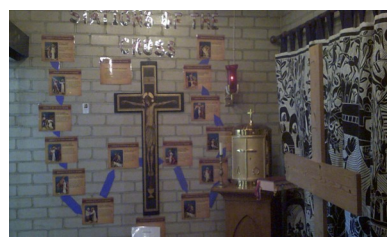
Year Two News

On CAFOD Family Fast Day, Year Two had a visit from two CAFOD volunteers to help us understand the difficulties that refugees face. We did this through drama. We quickly had to get into family groups and pack our bags but we only had ten minutes to decide what to take with us. A lorry came to pick us up but the roads were so bad that some of us lost our belongings in our bags and there was no time for the lorry to stop. Our belongings were lost forever.

At one point the lorry turned over. Luckily, we were safe but the lorry was out of action so we all had to walk. A few of us had hurt our legs so we needed support from other people in the group. We walked to the port so that we could catch a boat to take us to safety.

When we arrived at the port, we found that the boats were not big enough so some of us had to be separated from our families. As we climbed on the boat, we were asked to pay so we if we didn't have any money in our bag we had to sell our belongings to the boatmen.

Eventually we got on the boat but the sea was rough and the belongings that we did have left got soaked, so they were ruined. We did reach a new land but we had nothing with us.



What have you been doing for Lent?

Year Two are saying an extra prayer every day before lunch. This is our year group Lenten promise and we all have our own promises too. Illness

Please may we remind you of the 48 hour rule which is particularly important at this time of year. If your child has suffered a tummy upset please do not send him/her to school until 48 hours after the last symptom. If you are aware that sickness has been caused by something other than a bug, please ensure you inform the class teacher as in such instances the 48 hour rule does not apply! Please contact the school office for advice if you are unsure as to whether your child should be in school with specific issues such as conjunctivitis, skin complaints etc.

If your child is suffering from a cough or cold we are happy to administer **prescribed** medicine in school but will ask that you complete a form with detailed instructions beforehand. Please do not send **ANY** medications in with children. Thank you.

First Day Contact

First day contact will be made with parents if a child is absent and the reason has not been communicated to school. This should in no way be considered to be intrusive or a nuisance, it is purely to ensure the safety and well-being of all our children.

Volunteers

Changes to pick up

Although we understand that delays in pick up can inevitably happen, can we ask that you telephone the school office as soon as you are aware so that we can ensure that the class teacher is informed.

If your child is signed up to an after school club it is essential that you let us know if they will not be attending as a register is taken and we need to check on the whereabouts of any missing children.

Thank you for your continued support in helping us to keep all children safe in school.



Road Safety



Government guidance clearly shows that the zigzags outside the school should not be used as a drop off point for your children. **“Keep entrance clear of stationary vehicles, even if picking up or setting down children.”** Please drive into school to drop off your child if you have to drive in to Devon Road—this is the only safe way of dropping off. We are increasingly concerned about the dangerous manoeuvres in Devon Road. Please can we ask that drivers do not do multiple point turns in the road. When dropping off at school in the morning please could we ask that you **do not stop on the hazards** but instead drop your child off in the disabled bays. They can then walk up the steps by the office and along the path to get into school. By doing this it should mean that 5 cars could all drop at the same time and hopefully will make it quicker for you all.

Alternatively why not park in the surrounding roads and walk to school?

It can be fun and interesting. You get to notice things along the way and the benefits are: children love walking with their friends, especially on the journey to school. It makes them feel good. Exercise makes them feel calmer and happier while improving concentration, making it easier to focus in school. It also promotes independence and freedom. Children can also make more decisions about their journey than they can in the car. They can choose to stop and look at something along the way and they can start to make decisions about road safety.

It 's also a good opportunity to master spellings and tables facts.
