visited 10 years ago for a sunshine holiday. The island was beautiful and the local people wonderful despite everyone being so very poor. As I explained to the congregation, at the smart hotel we stayed at the waiting staff at table were mainly qualified dentists, doctors and engineers as they could earn more money in tips in the restaurant than in their professions. Despite their poverty they all smiled, sang and danced and we in, the privileged western society, could learn much from their attitude to life and their strong Catholic faith.

So having been able to share my experience of the island of Cuba I was able to focus on the poverty we still face here in Cornwall, being the poorest part of the UK despite it being a holiday hotspot for the rich, similar to Cuba. I

proudly put over examples of grant aid we had given to struggling families across the Diocese and the educational benefits of the Patchwork Parenting programme. I did thank them for giving me time in the middle of the service and the cream teal enjoyed with them in the parish hall.



really useful course. It made me think about different ways to encourage my child to become more independent and responsible for her behaviour (A Poole mum).

Parenting is a mixture of highs and lows ... and everything in between. Being a parent can be both rewarding and challenging. It can bring some of life's biggest joys, but also its greatest challenges and at times parents need others to come alongside them in their journey. For most parents, a bit of encouragement and a reminder that we're not alone can make a real difference.

The Patchwork Parenting programme has been running in Dorset, Devon and Cornwall for fifteen years. The courses it offers are commonly run in schools, and are made up of six to eight sessions led by trained and experienced facilitators and include group discussions and practical activities to equip, encourage and support parents, build on their strengths and give time and space to think about any changes they wish to make in bringing up their children. A helpful, easy to read handbook is included with each course. The benefits of sharing ideas and experiences with other parents can last a lifetime.

God gives me that reward. What I did sense was that when I run a long way (and 13 miles is long), the body seems to open the soul. The mind concentrates on breathing and something which normally gets in the way is denied headspace. A different prayer takes over. Not particularly eloquent or rehearsed. Just... "Thank you." I kept saying it in time with my breathing. And I meant it. Later it became "Help me" and I meant that too. These are not simple words. When breath itself is sought after, so is the prayer. It wasn't the race I was praying about. It was everything and it came from the core of me.

I enjoyed the Plymouth half-marathon. Not least because my final prayer returned to gratitude. Beyond the finishing line I pulled up. In front of me was a man who had run the race to raise money for the Alzheimer's Society. His T-shirt read "I ran this for my dad, who doesn't know who I am." Stupid me with a tear in my eye, thanking God for a generosity that comes from adversity
