A note on the Easter Vigil

When we hear reports of people 'keeping vigil' at the bedside of loved ones we know perfectly well what vigil means in that sense - it is about giving up time - lots of it - simply to be there, in that presence. It is not about 'doing' anything, not about achieving anything; it is simply waiting attentively. The Easter Vigil – 'O truly blessed night' – is the most lavish Liturgical celebration of the year - 'the greatest and most noble of all solemnities' and necessitates careful preparation and solemn celebration. A very significant part of the celebration is the Liturgy of the Word where 'Holy Church meditates on the wonders the Lord God has done for his people, from the beginning.' For those being baptised there is rarely any danger of the Liturgy not having a powerful effect, but for all Christians, the wonders proclaimed in Scripture and the strong symbolic actions with light, water, oil, bread and wine can make this a 'truly blessed night when things of heaven are wed to those of earth, and divine to the human.' When people are suitably prepared, the long unfolding of God's wonders in the readings from the Old Testament truly recount the story of faith, and any reduction of the number of readings will be a deprivation: 'all of which should be read whenever this can be done, so that the character of the Vigil, which demands an extended time, may be preserved.' This is rich fare which cannot be rushed - this is a Vigil which requires attentive waiting and faithful watching.

Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord

John 20.1-9

Today's gospel can seem strange to many – there is no great drama presented about the Resurrection. The evidence is sparse and consists of a few cloths and the way they are displayed. Both Peter and John see the (limited) evidence, but John is the one who understands. John is assumed to be the disciple who is always described as 'the beloved disciple'. That can be the key to this passage; John is able to interpret the simple sign of burial cloths, because his love has given him a deeper insight into the reality of the one he knew and loved. The evidence for the presence of Jesus among us is always based on his love for humanity and the love which that enables to be reciprocated. It is worth noting that in his great address to Cornelius and his household, Peter puts such a strong emphasis on the fact that he and those with him are personal witnesses to the Risen Christ, 'we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.' That becomes a common feature of the accounts of the appearances of Jesus after the Resurrection. The Lord is encountered and shares food with his disciples. Christianity is ultimately not a code of life or set of rules or a worldview, but a relationship with the Risen Lord – with one who is known and encountered. Christians are those who know Jesus Christ, and, as is done every time the Eucharist is celebrated, 'we have eaten and drunk with him.'
