Dear Parents and Carers,

I would like to take the opportunity to update you on the life of the school this week. Last month's snowfall has been followed by this month's heat wave and we have all been enjoying some time appreciating the outdoors here at school. You may have seen the recently renovated play equipment in the KS1 playground; the children have already been putting this to good use and have enjoyed the opportunity to use some of the other sporting equipment which has recently been unearthed during a clear up of the sports pavilion.

The reason for the spring clean is that the school is now offering an after-school club to work in tandem with the Early Bird morning care system. We are very fortunate to have the astro-turf available for weather like this and so the decision was made to base the club in the newly-tidied pavilion for the summer term.

This box contains a range of props which will be used in next week's KS2 assembly when the "house" debates an issue using the adversarial British system of democracy. KS1 children will also be given an insight into the Parliamentary process when the KS2 children who attended the Westminster expedition visit each class to impart their knowledge.
