Easter

Reflection by Father John

This coming Sunday, Palm Sunday, marks the beginning of Holy week. It's the most important week of the Church's year. The week begins with Jesus entering Jerusalem triumphantly welcomed by the people. A few days later, on Good Friday, the people shout "crucify Him, crucify Him!" as Jesus is led out to his crucifixion and death. But the death of Jesus was not an end but a new beginning. On Easter Sunday we celebrate Christ's glorious Resurrection. His death has brought us to life.

On Wednesday of Holy week the Priests and people of the diocese gather with the Bishop in the Cathedral to celebrate the Chrism Mass when the priests renew their Ordination promises and the Oils of Chrism and Catechumen are consecrated and blessed by the Bishop. On Thursday evening we celebrate the Mass of the Last Supper. Remembering the night that he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took some bread, broke it and said "this is my body which is for you; do this as a memorial to me". In the same way he took the cup after supper and said, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Whenever you drink it, do this as a memorial to me". Every time we celebrate Mass we re-present the one Sacrifice of Calvary and fulfil the Lord's command to do this in his memory. (1 Cor.11: 23-26) After Mass we watch at the altar of repose, recalling Christ's agony in the garden of Gethsemane.

On Good Friday at 3pm (The time of our Lord's death) we commemorate the passion and death of our Lord after which the church falls silent until the Easter Vigil. The Easter Vigil on Saturday evening is always celebrated after darkness has fallen and begins with blessing of the Easter fire and Paschal Candle from which the people's candles are lit. The Easter Proclamation is sung and then we listen to several Old Testament readings which tell us the story of salvation history. Then the 'Gloria' is intoned, bells are rung to the accompaniment of an organ fanfare and the lights come on. After the New Testament reading, the Easter Alleluia is proclaimed as we celebrate Christ's resurrection. The third part of the Vigil is the celebration of the 'Baptismal Liturgy' during which the Easter water is blessed, baptisms take place and those coming into full communion of the Catholic Church are received and confirmed while everyone present renews their own baptismal promises. The Vigil then moves into the liturgy of the Eucharist when once more we fulfil the Lord's command at the Last Supper to do this in his memory.

The celebration of Easter continues for fifty days and concludes with the celebration of Pentecost.

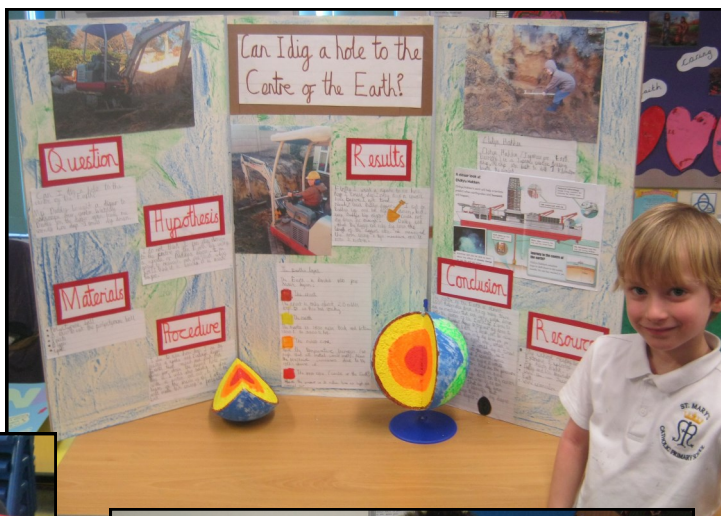

Year 1 Science Investigations The Year One children have been very busy finding out about how far a rocket can travel, what happens to a gingerbread man in different liquids, whether an orange floats or sinks, and what happens to milk and food colouring when washing up liquid is added. They have been enjoying exploring our school environment, looking for signs of Spring, and carrying out their own investigations into light, magnetism and materials.



Illness

Please may we remind you of the 48 hour rule which is particularly important at this time of year. If your child has suffered a tummy upset please do not send him/her to school until 48 hours after the last symptom. If you are aware that sickness has been caused by something other than a bug, please ensure you inform the class teacher as in such instances the 48 hour rule does not apply! Please contact the school office for advice if you are unsure as to whether your child should be in school with specific issues such as conjunctivitis, skin complaints etc.

If your child is suffering from a cough or cold we are happy to administer **prescribed** medicine in school but will ask that you complete a form with detailed instructions beforehand. Please do not send **ANY** medications in with children. Thank you.

First Day Contact

First day contact will be made with parents if a child is absent and the reason has not been communicated to school. This should in no way be considered to be intrusive or a nuisance, it is purely to ensure the safety and well-being of all our children.

If your child is signed up to an after school club it is essential that you let us know if they will not be attending as a register is taken and we need to check on the whereabouts of any missing children.

Road Safety



Government guidance clearly shows that the zigzags outside the school should not be used as a drop off point for your children. **“Keep entrance clear of stationary vehicles, even if picking up or setting down children.”** Please drive into school to drop off your child if you have to drive in to Devon Road—this is the only safe way of dropping off. We are increasingly concerned about the dangerous manoeuvres in Devon Road. Please can we ask that drivers do not do multiple point turns in the road. When dropping off at school in the morning please could we ask that you **do not stop on the hazards** but instead drop your child off in the disabled bays. They can then walk up the steps by the office and along the path to get into school. By doing this it should mean that 5 cars could all drop at the same time and hopefully will make it quicker for you all.

Alternatively why not park in the surrounding roads and walk to school?

It can be fun and interesting. You get to notice things along the way and the benefits are: children love walking with their friends, especially on the journey to school. It makes them feel good. Exercise makes them feel calmer and happier while improving concentration, making it easier to focus in school. It also promotes independence and freedom. Children can also make more decisions about their journey than they can in the car. They can choose to stop and look at something along the way and they can start to make decisions about road safety.

It 's also a good opportunity to master spellings and tables facts.
