

E-Scooters

Did you know?

You are only allowed to ride an e-scooter on private land with the landowner's permission.

It is against the law to ride an e-scooter on public land including pavements, cycle lanes, beach promenades, bridleways, or any publicly accessible land such as parks and car parks.

Why is this?

E-scooters are classified as Personal Light Electric Vehicles. This means they are treated as motor vehicles and have to keep to the same legal requirements.

Where can I ride my e-scooter?

It is against the law to ride an e-scooter on public land including pavements, cycle lanes, roads, beach promenades, bridleways, or any publicly accessible land such as parks and car parks.

What happens if I'm caught?

You must stop using your e-scooter on public land immediately. The police can issue you a warning, can seize your scooter and the rider may also be liable for prosecution for traffic offences.
