This week the children in Years 1-6 took part in the trial of the new standardised termly tests for Maths and Reading. The tests increase in demand each term and provide a clear picture of progress throughout the year. We do not mark the tests in the trial but we were able to complete a questionnaire as to our thoughts and opinions about the papers.



On Wednesday evening, a group of Year 6 children were given the opportunity to attend another Lytchett Lecture with Miss Dann and Miss Lomas.

The lecture was called 'The Nature of Consciousness' and it was led by Dr Guy Sutton from Nottingham University Medical School.

Everyone reported that it was a fascinating lecture!
